I never get tired reading the words of First John. It begins by celebrating a spiritual life rooted in personal experience: "That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked at and our hands have touched —this we proclaim concerning the Word of life." God isn't philosophical abstraction or simply the tradition handed down to them by their parents. It is experience rooted in encounter with the Holy come to us in Jesus Christ. We write this to make our joy complete." In short, our life with God spills over into contagious joy, which looks like different kinds of things. I see it each week in the faces of those who play and sing in worship. It isn't performance. It is joy spilling over, inviting us to be in joy with them. I share my contagious joy when I talk to others about the kind of church Centenary is with others, where we do not always think alike but we work to love alike.

As we pass through Spring into summer, I invite you to become contagious. Let the light and warmth of the sun soak into your soul, and share that light and warmth with others who may be new to Pentwater or just looking for a place to belong. This is a good place, too, to remember that contagious joy means we become cheerleaders for each other, not because we always agree, or because we always do things the very same way, but because we see the gifts God has for us in each other. Receive the gifts God has for you in your neighbor and give thanks for them.

The Worship Team is working hard. We are almost at the end of the Easter season and our series on the parables, which I've really enjoyed. This week is very special. Pastor Roy Martens will be teaching on the Parable of the Wheat and Tares before leading us into the celebration of Communion. In the following weeks we will celebrate the Ascension of Christ to the Father with a reflection on his last words to is as his disciples, then Pentecost, and finally Trinity Sunday,

which holds a special place in my heart. Our summer series, At the Water's Edge, traces the movement of water through our faith story, from its beginning in creation to the River of Life found in Revelation. We worship a God whose love flows through water. I think we'll have to celebrate our baptisms with a little water from the Jordan.

Even while we do that, the Worship Team is trying to take a little time to reflect on our work with you, and how we engage the congregation in worship. Please do not hesitate to contact Pastor Vaughn or Marsha with your input about making more room in our service for everyone to take an active part. If you'd like to join the team, please do. We're especially in need of people with a creative eye or insight into nurturing a virtual worship community.

I've had some questions about General Conference and responded to them in other newsletters. It began last week, with most of its work in legislative committees, which essentially filter petitions for the full membership. Repetitive motions are often bundled or a single one is chosen to stand in for all of them. Those petitions that pass legislative committee with a very high threshold (somewhere around 90%+) are placed on the consent calendar and will not require a vote by the full conference unless a member requests a vote. Other pieces may be passed on to vote with recommendation from the committee. Some die there. This year our delegates were asked to sift through a little over 1,000 proposals. Some pieces of legislation will not only require a supermajority vote at General Conference but a super majority of the vote taken across all annual conference in the world. In any case, you can expect a summary of important actions taken within two weeks of its end.

I've included a couple of info-graphics. The graphic on page 3 gives you a nice overview of all the pieces that make up our church. The second graphic on page 5 shows the General Conference and its makeup.

Treasurer's Quarterly Report January - March 2024

We had a pretty good first quarter. We had budgeted to lose just over \$10,000 and only lost \$1000, well done to our givers! The finance and operations (F&O) decided to invest some of our savings (rainy day fund) into CD's so that we could earn a little cash. Our insurance cost went up providing a little better coverage and an increase in the value of church and parsonage. We have an old/new committee reforming, currently called Endowment/Planned Giving, and they will be looking at our investment with the United Methodist Foundation of Michigan. Our funds are at \$211,723 with a mix of endowment, designated, undesignated and earnings. We had a financial review done for 2022, see Janet's article for what came out of that. Remember the monthly financials are posted on the wall just outside of office. If you have any questions, please give Janet or myself a call or catch me at church.

The Book of Discipline for the United Methodist Church requires that congregations of our size have an annual financial review of the records of this church. This had not been done for many years. The Finance and Operations Committee, with the approval of the Church Council hired an outside bookkeeper and church treasurer, recommended by the Conference, who has just finished her review of the 2022 records. While many of the items on her check list were being



followed, she did point out a few weaknesses. Several of these have already been addressed and corrected. Some are difficult for a congregation of our size to follow and would require several more regular volunteers.

One of our biggest weaknesses is the approval of expenditures. We need your help to accomplish this. Whenever an expense is presented for payment, an Expense Authorization Form, available in the church office, must be completed and signed by both the requestor and by the appropriate ministry team leader. An invoice or receipt must be included with the form. Requests that do not follow these requirements will be returned for completion before payment can be made. After Council's approval, the same bookkeeper will be hired to do a review of the 2023 financial records.

From your Community Dinner coordinators

We're coming to the end of another year of Community Dinner! As our name suggests, it takes a community to serve dinner each week. We have cooks and dining room preparers and servers and dishwashers and label creators; and a whole crew of bakers who contribute homemade desserts; and others who work remotely, from their winter residences, organizing volunteer schedules and providing an inspirational message each week. We couldn't do this labor of love, serving over 180 meals per week, without all of our volunteers.

Our outreach this year has focused on offering frozen individual meals. Since early January when we began promoting the availability of frozen meals within our church and to organizations in Oceana County, this ministry has provided, on average, 23 meals a week. With a small group of volunteers cooking once per month, we plan to stock the freezer throughout the summer.

Our last Community Dinner this Spring is May 15th. You may have heard about the eggplant donation. As "Cooks' Choice" we'll be serving some of it in a classic dish with a tasty twist: Ratatouille and Sausage Potpie accompanied by soup, salad and dessert. We hope you can join us!

Prayers & Squares - 100th Quilt Given!

"To make art is to make love with the sacred." - Mirabai Starr

"The mystery is Christ within you, your hope of glory." - Colossians 1:27

Prayers & Squares is a unique ministry. In preparing for the Ministry Workshop that was held at the end of April at CUCM, I began taking a close look at what our ministry is about. I thought about the original mission. I wondered if and how we lived that vision with integrity. I mused about the ways we were inspired to add to the original vision. Most importantly, I was struck by how all of us who participate have been transformed through witnessing its impact...and by discovering the depth of caring we hold for one another.

One of the elements of our uniqueness is in the artistry of our quilts. Making art allows the artist to lose her/himself in the artistic expression itself...inviting the Divine to 'have its way with it'. Although making a quilt requires some precision and skill...as well as, in most cases, the decision to follow a pattern... we are always delighted by the final outcome! And, the anticipation of the recipient's response cannot be measured or determined beforehand. It's a holy moment.

While reading one morning I came across an excerpt that felt true. The writer used the term "spiritual practice" but I'm going to substitute the term "spiritual ministry" as I believe the terms overlap. The writer indicated that all (spiritual ministries) have the purpose of allowing us "to touch the depths of our inner selves and to live a generous life of participation with Divine Love in absolute wholeheartedness... and to move from what we know in our heads about God to living and moving and having our being in God" (Felicia Murell). In other words, we become living expressions of God! In our 'acts of creation' (the quilts) we become living aspects of our Creator. In the act of giving comfort and hope to the recipients of our quilts we become ambassadors of Christ.

Speaking of providing comfort and hope, we will be giving our 100th (!!) prayer quilt to Judy Koorndyke. Judy suffered a massive stroke this month and is currently in Mary Freebed undergoing rehab. She is a member of the First Baptist Church in Pentwater where her husband, Bruce, serves as a deacon. We are also working on two additional prayer quilt requests as well as working hard on our Pocket Quilt production.

The pocket squares are proving to be quite popular!

In closing, I would like to encourage you to bask in appreciation of May's 'pop' of color as the flowers burst forth and remind us of God's artistry. The promise of sunny days and warmer temperatures make my heart sing!


