




For those of you who make fresh starts in the fall, consider making your worship home with us. This fall

ReNew to Be the Breath of God in Community

Happy New Year

Renew marks the start of the new program year at Centenary. September seems more of the "new year" start than January: In from the Village Green, Community Dinner starts, Stretch Class (?), United Women of Faith

and Church Conference (Centenary's annual meeting) to name a few. With ReNew as with the Stewardship Campaign, we renew our commitment to support – giving, of course, but also time and service.

Here is a brief list of variety of programs, studies and other services that makes up our pledge to "Be the Breath of God in Community." Pentwater is a seasonal town, so note that your help is needed anytime you are available. ZOOM makes much more possible -thank you COVIDallowing you to serve remotely on church council, worship team, and other areas. The emphasis this year is **Deep & Wide**. Yes, we have a wide variety of opportunities. This year we look for deepening—as in deepening our faith—opportunities as well.

Small Groups

We learn and grow in small groups: supporting caregivers, washing pots and pans, quilting with friends, participating in a study group. The connection and the relationships built here move us forward in developing our faith. We are Christians and we grow as Christians. This is a journey. This new program year can be a stepping off point. Here are some types of small groups:

Task Groups: Groups built around a specific task might include potato peelers (Community Dinner), worship ushers and greeters, tech group, counters to record weekly collection, volunteers for property management events - painting, repairing, installing. Bell choir has added a great service to our worship.

Social Groups: informal golf groups, Mears UMC has a group who regularly goes out to dinner called the Fort Lifters, Euchre on Tuesday night, fishing friends --- the list can be long and is often informal, but church friends enrich our lives. United Women of Faith, even with its independent ties to and resources from the larger church, can be a social group. And a task group (providing memorial service lunches for example) and a study group.

Study Group: Adult Study group (Sunday mornings before worship), summer study groups with a guidebook and discussion. Pastor Vaughn will lead a spiritual formation group beginning October 1 using Learning from Jesus as a resource. Prayer groups also span several definitions

but when centered with scripture or a study book, could fit here. Note: Centenary does not currently have a prayer group!

<u>Healing/support group</u>: Roy Martens is planning a small group in October. (See below) A small group will be open to individuals seeking connection and support for an individual situations. The group will listen and pray and support. We live in troubled times. Other support groups include Caregiver Support which offers information and experience to those in caregiver (spouse, parent, child) roles. Meditation Group which meets in the library providing quiet reflection and meditation time for members.

<u>Classic Sunday School model</u>: Methodism spread quickly using a Sunday School system that has some application today. Early churches did not always have access to a preacher. Methodist preachers rode a circuit of churches preaching, marrying, baptizing etc. In the time between the congregations met as Sunday School class or classes. The leading question was always the same "How is it with your soul this week?"

ReNewing Small Groups

Small groups need access! You cannot join if you do not know about a group. Kyle Jansen, Centenary office administrator, has developed some single handouts for individual groups to introduce them to new members and friends.

Small groups need leadership and a sense of connection and support with the whole church.

Small groups provide a place where new ideas can surface. Social principles? Work groups? Singles group? A grief support group? We have room to grow!

The following list shows ReNew opportunities for this year. Let us see what we can do. Prayerfully and thoughtfully, how can we, with God's guidance, connect and grow.



Letter from Les & Debbie Dornan of the Dornonmission

Well, my bags are not packed, and I'm not ready to go....but our tickets have been purchased! We fly from Chicago on Sept. 29 arriving Kathmandu on October 1. Now we really do need to get serious about sorting, packing, storing and fitting everything we need into the baggage allowance for Qatar airlines. Les has only 3 more days in the office and we are starting to feel the time crunch!

In the past 4 months we have enjoyed a trip to Zeeland, 2 trips to

California, a trip to Peoria and a visit to England. We have enjoyed a visit from a friend from Japan as well as visits from kids and grandkids. All were greatly enjoyed! During our June travels to CA to attend niece Kimberly's graduation, Dad became ill and was hospitalized. We are very thankful he recovered and was able to make the trip back to Indiana – just a day later than planned. Later we went back to CA with Luke, Laura and the grandkids – and wondered how we ever did those long flights when our own children were little!

The trip to Manchester, England, was wonderful. We were so glad to be in Hannah and Nathan's place for the first time, and to enjoy the lovely area where they live. We also spent a couple of days in Scarborough thanks to wonderful friends who let us use their bungalow for 2 nights. We had beautiful weather and lots of good food and board games.

We have been enjoying the "fruits" of Indiana summers – especially corn on the cob and fresh tomatoes from the garden. Wonderful! Another activity I look forward to each day is actually washing dishes! This is because of the hummingbirds who visit our feeder just outside the kitchen window. There are at least 5 birds – and one has claimed ownership of the feeder, and stands watch to chase away the others! It is always amusing to see them darting around trying to get a quick sip of nectar before the "boss" bird runs them off!

The hospital in Tansen has been facing some difficulties. Troubles have arisen with the insurance scheme run by the government. Unfortunately, the hospital has not been able to make ends meet and has had to make some tough decisions which will affect patients and probably staff, as well. Please pray that we can continue to serve the patients who cannot get health care elsewhere. Let me share the story of one little girl and her family.

Karishma, a 7-year-old girl in class one, was returning home from school one day when she saw a tree with ripe mangos! She climbed up to find the best fruit, but fell from a height of 10 - 12 feet onto the ground. Her mother was at the tap getting water to carry back to the house when some friends found her and told her about her daughter. Karishma's mother went to where she had fallen to take her home, but the little girl was unable to stand. She had severe pain and swelling of the right leg so they suspected it had been broken. Other people helped to get her onto the back of a motorbike and brought her to Tansen hospital. In the ER, she was diagnosed with a right femur fracture and was admitted into the pediatric ward. Her mother had not been able to come with her to the hospital as she had to go home to get her younger (2-year-old) daughter. A visitor stayed with Karishma until her mother came the next day. The father was in Butwal looking for work, so the surgery was scheduled for 2 days after the admission. Because the family asked for help, they were referred to the pastoral care department and were assessed for the financial ability to pay.

Karishma has 3 siblings – her oldest sister is 15 and studies in class 8. Her brother is 11 in class 3, and the youngest sister is 2. The 4 children and their parents (6 total) live in a very small house – only a kitchen and bedroom – and they have almost nothing except a small piece of land where they get 1 - 2 doko (baskets) of corn. Karishma's father used to work in India as a laborer, but he fell and injured his spine. After treatment, he tried working again, but had another accident and fractured his leg. It took a long time for him to heal and things were very difficult for the family during that time. 3 - 4 months prior to Karishma's fall, he had gone to Butwal and had found work in a hotel as a helper. However, he had not sent any money back yet, and they didn't communicate much as they had no cell phone or land line. Her mother does seasonal labor and gets about 300 rupees per day for that, but this isn't enough to support the family, so they really needed help from the hospital fund for poor patients. During Karishma's time in the hospital, both she and her mother worried a lot. It was not easy for her mother to stay with her 2-year-old to care for. The pastoral care staff spent much time listening, and giving emotional and educational support. The family became more relaxed and comfortable with the situation and were thankful for the services they received and for the large amount of financial help which was given. The were able to return home happily with a good outcome.

Karishma was discharged and when they came for follow up, they were able to pay a small amount towards her treatment. Karishma's mother said, "If this hospital had not supported my daughter, I cannot imagine what would have happened!" Now her daughter can move around well and will walk and run again.

This morning at church in Middletown, we sang the anthem, "He's Never Failed Me Yet". Les sang the solo, and it was a joyful musical reminder that God asks us to keep our eyes on Him.

"I will sing of God's mercy Every day, every hour He gives me power. I will sing and give thanks to Thee For all the dangers, toils and snares that He has brought me out. He is my God and I'll serve Him No matter what the test Trust and never doubt, Jesus will surely bring you out He never failed my yet."

Even though this wonderful season here in Indiana is coming to a close, we give thanks for many times with family and friends – weddings (in Puerto Rico and NYC!) and family gatherings (Harsh, Wolber, and Dornon), as well as times with friends. And we look forward to what God has planned next!

Thank you for your prayers for us during these weeks of transition and farewells. We cannot say how much we have enjoyed being here with many of you during this past year, and even those we don't see often – your care and support are what keeps us going.


11. Reviewed offer from fireplace installers at the parsonage for an annual fireplace checkup. Decided to pass on the offer at this time.
